Best-ever student satisfaction scores

Our students are declaring themselves happier with their University of Surrey experience than ever before, according to the National Student Survey (NSS).

The overall satisfaction rate reported by our final year students rose by an astonishing 15% between 2006 and 2012*, pushing us up the NSS league table 81 places. Amongst the most satisfied are accounting, tourism, biosciences and mathematics students.

Surrey in the league tables

The University of Surrey has achieved 12th place ranking in the joint Times/Sunday Times Good University Guide 2013 league table - up from 26th position in the Times and 21st in the Sunday Times last year.



Surrey is ranked number two in the South East, second only to Oxford. The league table is based on performance in a number of key areas, covering student satisfaction with the quality of teaching and academic feedback, course content and facilities, graduate job prospects and the quality of research.

The Times and Sunday Times also shortlisted Surrey as one of five finalists for the University of the Year. This follows hot on the heels of Surrey's success in entering the Guardian's University League Table's top ten for the first time in June 2013, achieving

National Student Survey 2013

Our students are more satisfied than ever after a third successive increase in the National Student Survey 2013. We moved up to the top ten in the country for student satisfaction.

Our students in Accounting, Tourism, and Biosciences have an impressive 96% satisfaction rate, and Mathematics proved the best-performing subject with 97%. Teaching in Politics received a near-perfect 99% satisfaction score.

Officially impressive research

The last Research Assessment Exercise (RAE) brought official recognition for the quality of our research.

The RAE rated 99% of our research units world-leading, internationally excellent, or recognised either nationally or internationally, and placed 4 of our research areas in the UK's top 10.

Professional Training placements

We are extremely proud of our Professional Training placement programme. It has a transformational effect on the people who take part in it – people like you.

The programme is one of the largest in the world, with over 1000 partner organisations in the UK and overseas, and is an integral part of our degree programmes.

Almost every Surrey undergraduate, including International Study Centre alumni, can choose to do a placement, regardless of degree subject. That's unique.

No other university anywhere in the world has a placement programme like this. As a result, no other university has professional, experienced, seriously impressive graduates like ours.

That's the difference Surrey can give you. That's what really makes us proud.

What is a Professional Training placement?

Professional Training is a period of work experience between the 2nd or 3rd and final year of study. This period typically lasts 30 weeks to 12 months and may be formed of one or more placements. A placement may also be paid work experience.

Why go on a placement?

Our students have said the programme has helped them:

- » gain confidence, maturity and motivation
- » provide focus for their final year of study
- » confirm their career path
- » open their eyes to opportunities they had never previously considered
- » show them jobs that they would or would not like do in the future

With you every step of the way

Preparation starts in the second year of your degree, with special modules to get you ready for the workplace.

A member of staff will explain the process and how placements are advertised. We also offer workshops to help you with CV writing and interview questions. Unlike other universities, we don't just leave you to fend for yourself when you're on placement. You will be visited several times by a member of staff from your department.

Excellent partners

Placements are advertised throughout the year and with over 1000 partners you will have lots to choose from. Partners include IBM, Sony Ericsson, HSBC, Walt Disney, Ernst & Young, British Airways and Four Seasons Hotels and Resorts.

What's more, you can be sure that your placement is a real job, with real responsibilities on real projects. We simply won't put our good name to anything less.

Placements around the world

Our Professional Training placement programme is one of the best in the world. Some students spend their placements with a UK company or organisation, in a university research laboratory, some go to Europe or further afield.

In the past two years students have been on placements in Peru, Mexico, New Zealand, African countries and Australia. Others do projects with research organisations. During placements students are visited by teaching staff.

For my placement year I worked at Gamma Telecommunications as a software developer. On a day to day basis I worked as an analyst and web software developer. I also managed the database for the products the company was working on.

The career's office at Surrey helped immensely. They had a job database tailored to placement students which had the job description and contact details of the relevant person to apply to. We would always get notified by email when a new job was added or when a job was reaching its application deadline. This made the process so much easier because we didn't need to spend hours reading newspapers or searching online for jobs relating to our degree. The process was stress-free and I am actually the first Surrey student to work at Gamma Telecommunications.

I'm very happy I took a placement as it will definitely help me in my future. I'm confident about entering the job market after I graduate as I have lots of real world experience that will set me apart from other graduates seeking employment. Companies will be able to see that I can apply what I've learnt at university. While on placement I have learnt how to take responsibility for my actions and learn from mistakes. I now have a better understanding of the industry I want to work in and plan to continue to learn about the business world and respect it.



Library & Learning Centre

The refurbished £13m Library & Learning Centre lies at the heart of the campus and offers state-of-the art facilities. This is the academic centre of the University which also includes the Appleseed bookshop and a popular ground floor meeting area. Here you'll find a vast collection of books and journals plus you can access the electronic collection of books and journals on or off campus. There are silent areas for individual study, communal learning zones for group work, and bookable rooms.

We offer 1,240 study spaces, over 300 open access computers, sound and image collections and resources for language self-study, self-service issues and returns, printing, scanning and photocopying, and an informal meeting space.

The library is open daily, staying open 24 hours a day during semester and for long opening hours during vacations and outside semester weeks. We have an academic librarian for each subject area who will introduce you to the Library and help you to find and use the information resources for your academic needs.

SPLASH

The Student Personal Learning and Study Hub (SPLASH) is a student-centred area designed to enhance your study. Via appointments, drop-ins and workshops, Student Learning Advisors can help in your academic and personal development and improve your writing, presenting, revision, time management and any other academic skills. Academic Liaison Librarians also work from SPLASH, offering advice on finding resources, using databases and referencing.

Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)

The University has recently launched SurreyLearn, a new Virtual Learning Environment. This online environment is used in a variety of innovative ways to support and enhance learning and teaching.

You will be able to use SurreyLearn to access information and guidance related to your programme modules and to enjoy a rich set of activities and interactive materials that support your learning. These include group and independent activities such as discussion forums, self-tests and online assignments. These can be accessed from any computer with an internet connection as well as mobile devices such as iPads, iPhones and other smartphones.

SurreyLearn also provides additional ways for staff to be creative and responsive in their teaching approaches, for example, by providing online guidance and feedback in flexible ways. This all helps to support you to learn and work more flexibly and in ways that suit your learning style and situation.


...and enjoy



All students at the University are members of the Students' Union and you will automatically become a member, free-of-charge, when you start studying here.


Working for you

Ivy Arts Centre

Many of our events take place in the £4.5 million lvy Arts Centre, which opened in June 2011.

Housed in a former sports building that became redundant with the opening of the University's new Surrey Sports Park, the Ivy Arts Centre provides a theatre, studios, workshops, dressing rooms and various other spaces, including a large wardrobe store, costume-making room and laundry.

The theatre seats 200 people and includes a box office, foyer and bar area.

"The new venue, coupled with the GSA opposite it, realises the ambition of creating an arts hub right at the entrance to the campus," says Professor Phil Powrie, Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Human Sciences. "Staff, students and visitors will now enter the University through an arts gateway."

"This is a testament to the University of Surrey's commitment to promoting the arts, both as a key academic discipline and as one of the major ways in which we support the creative industries. It also puts another top-class venue on Guildford's cultural map."

Performing Arts Technology Studios (PATS)

Located a short walk along the spine road from the main entrance, this building is home to:

- » PATS Studio One a flexible-capacity concert hall and sound-recording studio, seating up to 260, this is the primary performance space for music concerts at the University and hosts the weekly lunchtime and rushhour concerts, which are free to all staff, students and the public
- » PATS Dance Studio a multipurpose rehearsal and performance space for dance and theatre; this venue is also used for regular film screenings

Lewis Elton Gallery

If you are interested in visual art, we have our very own on-campus gallery. The Lewis Elton Gallery presents a dynamic series of exhibitions featuring nationally and internationally known artists. Students are always welcome to come to private views, which are usually attended by the exhibiting artist.

Accommodation at a glance...

- » About two thirds of our accommodation is on the Stag Hill Campus and more than 50 per cent of rooms have en suite shower and toilet facilities.
- » Manor Park is about one mile away, 20 minutes' walk or a short cycle ride, it has over 1,500 en suite rooms and easy access to the Surrey Sports Park.
- » Students share a kitchen-dining room, conveniently close to bedrooms.
- » Access to free broadband.
- » Communal areas with TV room, mail racks and friendly staff.
- » All residences are non-smoking.
- » Belongings insurance is provided at no additional charge.
- » Most accommodation is mixed-sex, but you can choose to live in a single-sex flat or floor if you wish.
- » Hazel Farm provides affordable accommodation, approximately 3 miles from Stag Hill Campus.



Your International Study Centre

If you would like to study at the University of Surrey, but do not meet the requirements for direct entry, you can take the International Foundation Year at the International Study Centre, which will ensure you gain the skills and knowledge to succeed.

Success starts here

Preparing for university is one of the most important things any student has to do. Making sure you have the academic and language skills you need to succeed will make your transition to university life a lot easier. The International Study Centre at the University of Surrey teaches you these skills as well as ways to enjoy living and studying in the UK.

Your first day at University

From the day you start your International Foundation Year, you are part of the University. The International Study Centre is based on the University's campus and you will have access to the University's facilities such as the Library & Learning Centre, Surrey Sports Park and Students' Union.

Welcoming students from around the world

The International Study Centre attracts students from all around the world. We are experienced at helping students adjust to life in the UK and at university. We look forward to welcoming you and will help you make the most of your time at the University of Surrey.

Supporting you

Programmes at the International Study Centre are taught by specialists in university preparation. Your progress will be monitored at all times to make sure you remain on track to successfully complete the programme, while encouraging you to develop throughout your time with us.

University-style teaching

Progression to your degree

International Foundation Year

The International Foundation Year is a programme of academic subjects, study skills and English language training designed specifically to provide international students with a pathway to undergraduate degree study at the University.

Study structure

You can choose one of two Foundation routes:

- » Business, Economics, Law and Politics
- » Engineering, Science and Mathematics

The course is modular in structure. You will study core units and subject specific units* which are carefully designed to focus on the academic areas most relevant to your chosen degree.

*units are subject to change

Flexible entry

You can begin the International Foundation Year in either September or February. You can progress onto your chosen degree the following September when you have achieved the required progression criteria.

Progression criteria

To progress onto your degree, you will need to achieve the overall average of 65% or above and at least 55% in every unit of the programme.

You will also need to take an IELTS test at the end of the International Foundation Year and achieve IELTS 6.5 with no score below 6.0.

Students wishing to progress to BSc International Hospitality Management, BSc International Hospitality and Tourism Management and BSc Tourism Management are also required to undergo an interview with Academic Tutors at the University.

Business, Economics, Law and Politics

The Business, Economics, Law and Politics International Foundation Year will give you the skills and tools to succeed on an undergraduate degree programme in one of these fields.

Core unit

English and Study Skills

You will develop your English communication skills and learn a range of study skills, including: writing and reading strategies; presentation and seminar participation; organisation of time and materials; meeting deadlines; and responding to feedback.

At the end of these units you will be able to use English language in your own academic work; give well structured presentations; confidently answer follow-up questions and contribute to seminar discussions; take notes from readings and lectures; plan, develop and write well structured academic essays; and be confident in self-directed learning strategies.

You will also study for the IELTS exam covering all four skills (listening, reading, writing and speaking) in order to be fully prepared to take an IELTS exam at the end of your academic year.

Subject-specific units

Business Studies 1 & 2

You will look at the operational and strategic problems facing business people in the modern market economy. These units will focus on a wide range of issues, such as management, human resource practice, marketing and ethical aspects.

Economics 1 & 2

These units introduce you to the basics of economics including: economic systems; types of goods; the allocation of resources; elasticity; price controls; types of markets; cost and revenue; economies of scale; and market failure.

Elective units

Financial Accounting 1 & 2

You will develop a sound foundation in the basic principles of financial accounting. Learn about double entry book keeping, preparation of trial balances, profit and loss statements, depreciation, limited companies, manufacturing accounts and the interpretation of accounts.

OR

English Legal System and Contract Law

During these units you will learn about law, the relationship between law, justice and morality, the sources of law, including British and European Union (EU) legislation and the doctrine of precedent, the Civil and Criminal Courts and the role of Judiciary.

The Engineering, Science and Mathematics International Foundation Year leads to a wide range of degrees in engineering, science and mathematics related subjects.

Core unit

English and Study Skills

You will develop your English communication skills and learn a range of study skills, including: writing and reading strategies; presentation and seminar participation; organisation of time and materials; meeting deadlines; and responding to feedback.

At the end of these units you will be able to: use English language in your own academic work; give well-structured presentations; confidently answer follow-up questions and contribute to seminar discussions; take notes from readings and lectures; plan, develop and write well-structured academic essays; and be confident in self-directed learning strategies.

You will also study for the IELTS exam covering all four skills (listening, reading, writing and speaking) in order to be fully prepared to take an IELTS exam at the end of your academic year.

Subject-specific units

Pure Mathematics 1

Learn about straight lines and linear equations, set theory and probability, statistics, linear programming, indices and logarithms and experimental laws.

Applied Mathematics 1&2

During these units you will study advanced vectors, forces and equilibrium, relative motion, Newton's Laws of Motion, friction and work, energy and power, centres of gravity/centres of mass and particle dynamics.

Chemistry 1 & 2

These units introduce you to formulae, equations and moles, atomic structure, introduction to redox systems, thermodynamics and bonding.


