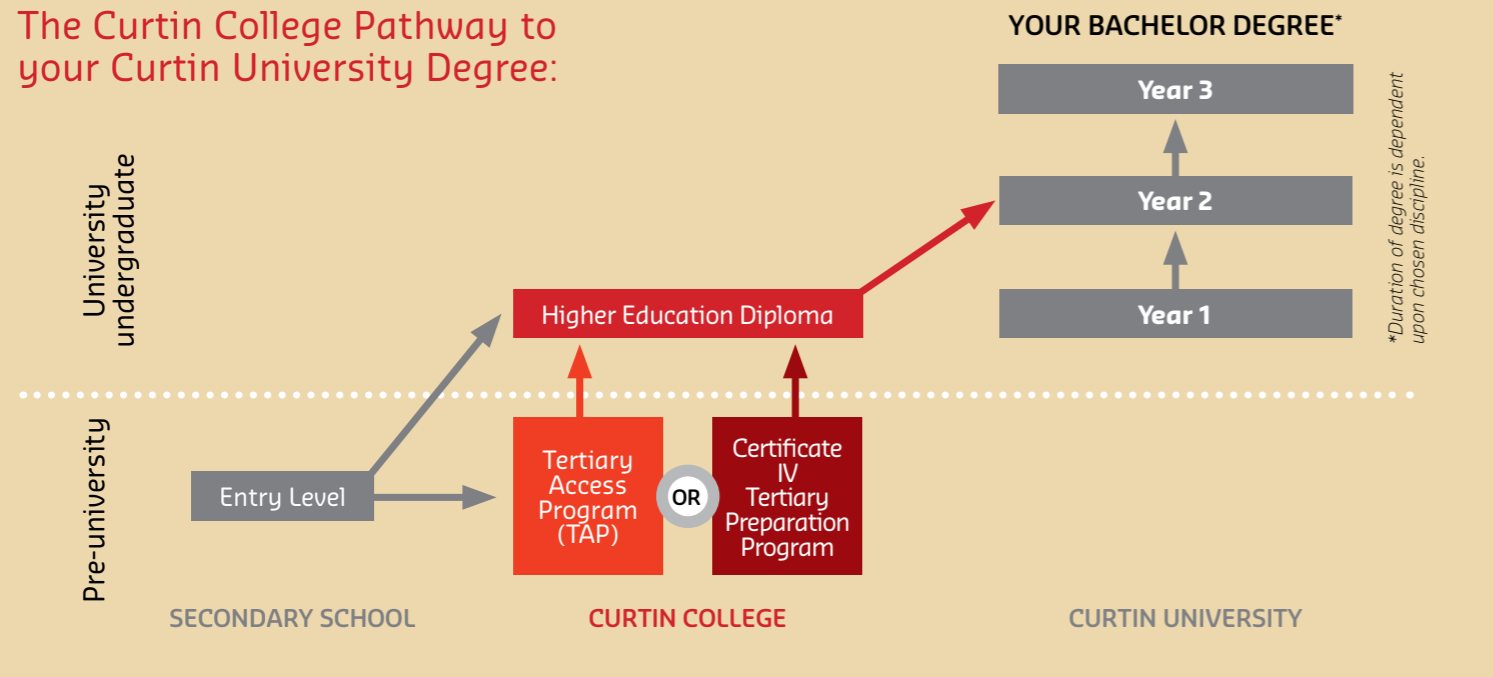
YOUR PATHWAY TO CURTIN UNIVERSITY

Since 2000, Curtin College has established itself as the major pathway to Curtin University, Western Australia's largest university. Located on the main Curtin campus in Perth, Western Australia, Curtin College has produced over 7,000 students who have successfully progressed to the second year of a bachelor degree at the University. Curtin College is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO) and higher education provider offering Curtin University units.

The advantages of studying at Curtin College include:

- The College is located on the main campus at Curtin University, providing access to Curtin's extensive range of resources and facilities.
- Students studying first year units will gain a Diploma qualification, as well as entry into the second year of their chosen bachelor degree at Curtin University.
- Fast-track options are available, with the trimester system offering three intakes per year.
- Smooth transition to year 2 at Curtin University.
- Small class sizes and a range of study support services to prepare you for university studies.
- Cultural diversity - around 1,200 students from 40 countries.

Support while you study

We're here for you, every step of the way.

Curtin College students can attend a number of support classes and workshops at no extra cost. This additional support serves to enhance your performance at the College and better prepare you for future study at the University.

ACADEMIC MASTER SERIES WORKSHOPS (AMS)

The aim of these workshops is to develop and build on your skills in key areas necessary to succeed at university such as time management, referencing, report writing, essay writing, and academic writing. They help to develop your confidence, to make your learning easier and more effective, and to increase your understanding of the university environment and expectations of lecturers.

ACADEMIC DROP IN SESSIONS

At the Drop In sessions, Curtin College students are able to get individual assistance with the preparation and presentation of assignments, referencing, language skills and general study skills. You can drop in at any time during the sessions to speak to an academic advisor.

MATHS CLINIC

The clinic is for all students studying any maths unit at the college. You can receive individual assistance with a maths lecturer on difficult problems and concepts that you're struggling with during the course.

ACADEMIC PEERS

Academic Peers are also on hand, so you can count on extra support from your peers too. This program is made up of high achieving students who are happy to assist you in your subjects. This is a great way to get advice from other students on coping with the work load and forming study groups.

ON-CAMPUS ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

Once enrolled at Curtin College, the following English support sessions are available and may be required for some students. These classes can be studied alongside your main study program.

ACADEMIC LANGUAGE ENGLISH PROGRAM (ALEP)

ALEP is a free 9 week program offered to Diploma students to help further develop their academic and English language skills. It is offered in all course streams and may be required if you score poorly in the entry English language test. ALEP focuses on the 4 language skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing; and grammar.

UNIVERSITY READINESS PROGRAMME (URP)

URP is a 7 week program offered to Certificate IV students to develop the English communication skills that you will need to succeed in a tertiary environment. URP runs as an interactive workshop where students actively participate in learning language.





FAQs

HOW DO I PROGRESS TO THE SECOND YEAR AT CURTIN UNIVERSITY?

Curtin College Diploma graduates must meet the minimum academic requirements and course-specific progression rules, in order to articulate with advanced standing into Year 2 of the corresponding bachelor degree at Curtin University.

Failure to pass all diploma units (200 credits), or meet the progression rules for your course will result in an extension of your study period and/or change to an alternative program of study in order to complete the Curtin College diploma.

Each study program has specific progression requirements in which you must achieve a minimum specified course average to progress to the next course in your packaged offer. These progression rules can be found on the Curtin College website. If your application to study is successful, you will receive a Letter of Offer, which will also state the progression rules necessary to progress.

HOW DOES THE TRIMESTER AND FAST-TRACK SYSTEM WORK?

For the Certificate IV Tertiary Preparation Program, Tertiary Access Program and Diplomas (excluding Diplomas of Engineering, Health Sciences, and Information Technology), the academic year is divided into three 13-week trimesters as follows:

- Trimester one: February to May
- Trimester two: July to October
- Trimester three: November to February.

The flexibility of the trimester system allows dedicated students to fast-track most Curtin College programs, reaching your desired degree at Curtin University sooner. Should you prefer a more gradual transition into university, you may be able to extend your studies over three trimesters, ensuring completion of the course within a 12-month period.

Please note: Early completion of a Curtin College program may alter the total packaged course duration.

For Diplomas of Health Sciences, Information Technology and Engineering, the academic year at the College follows the Curtin University semester calendar:

- Semester one: March to June
- Semester two: August to November.

IS ORIENTATION COMPULSORY

Yes. It is essential that you attend orientation. Subject to availability at the time of enrolment/during orientation, you may select your desired class times.

HOW WILL I BE TAUGHT?

At the College, students are exposed to a variety of teaching methods designed to promote a stimulating learning experience. Lecturers provide you with an outline for each unit of study, and ensure you acquire the relevant knowledge and skills. Lecture groups average between 20 and 50 students. The smaller class sizes at Curtin College ensure lecturers are able to get to know your personal study needs and you will normally have more contact hours with teaching staff than in the equivalent undergraduate classes at the university.

You can apply your knowledge and develop practical skills with group and individual project work as well as in laboratory sessions. Curtin College tutors have access to the latest technology and facilities to support their teaching and students benefit from interactive classrooms.

Tutorials and seminars are designed to complement the preceding lectures and provide a workshop environment to ensure you receive dedicated attention from the lecturers.

Every effort is made to ensure academic success, however you are expected to undertake private study, usually six to eight hours of additional study per week, per unit.

HOW WILL I BE ASSESSED?

You can expect a combination of written examinations, assignments, essays and presentations, depending on the area of study. Participation in seminars and tutorials is also taken into consideration. Coursework may include group projects and practical work.

CAN I GET CREDIT FOR PREVIOUS STUDY AND EXPERIENCE?

Credit for Recognised Learning (CRL) enables you to complete specified Certificate or Diploma courses sooner and is usually based on successful completion of equivalent modules or units of study at another institution. Applications for credits should include unit outlines (syllabus) and certified copies of any academic transcripts.

Curtin College also recognises the skills and knowledge you may have gained from life experiences, work experience and any training provided through previous employment. Requests for CRL should be made at the time of application and prior to arrival in Australia to ensure that correct visas are issued. Approval of CRL after the your visa has been granted may require the College to report the change of course duration under Section 19 of the ESOS Act. The granting of a Curtin College Diploma is contingent on students having studied a minimum of 50% of the course at Curtin College.

WHAT IS A PACKAGED OFFER?

Curtin College provide a packaged offer that leads to your bachelor degree at Curtin University. Curtin College package diplomas to single degrees, however if you wish to enrol in a double degree, you can do so by applying to Curtin at the end of your diploma. Current visa regulations allow students who wish to study a preliminary course(s) and a principal course (e.g. Diploma followed by a bachelor degree) to apply to have their program of study packaged onto one visa. Course packaging allows students to complete more than one course without having to re-apply for student visas or leave Australia to make the relevant applications. Students simply apply for a visa associated with the principal course.

The visa granted will be for the duration of all courses within the packaged offer, provided you have been issued with an electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) for each course.

What you need to know

WHAT COURSES ARE OFFERED AT CURTIN COLLEGE?

Curtin College offer a range of qualifications, which lead to the second year of selected Curtin bachelor degrees. The areas of study include:

- Built Environment
- Commerce
- Design & Art
- Engineering
- Health Sciences
- Information Technology/Computer Science
- Media, Culture & Creative Arts
- Social Sciences.

Pre-university Level

CERTIFICATE IV TERTIARY PREPARATION PROGRAM (CRICOS Code 084057K, NTIS Code 10479NAT)

Includes eight pre-university level units studied over a period of two to three trimesters, taught in Curtin College classrooms. All streams have three specific core units, with the remaining five being units specific to each stream. Progression to Diploma requires the achievement of qualifying grades varying from 50% to 65%.



TERTIARY ACCESS PROGRAM

Is a non-award course which includes four pre-university level units studied over one trimester, taught in Curtin College classrooms. Progression to Diploma requires the achievement of qualifying grades varying from 50% to 65%.

University Level

HIGHER EDUCATION DIPLOMA

Eight or nine university level units studied over a two to three trimesters.* The Diploma has the same course content and structure as year one of the corresponding Curtin University undergraduate degree. The Diplomas of Commerce, Information Technology, Built Environment and Arts & Creative Industries are taught in Curtin College classrooms. The Diplomas of Engineering and Health Sciences classes are primarily taught by Curtin College, along with a small number of shared Curtin University classes.

Progression to year two at Curtin requires achievement of qualifying grades varying from 50% to 65% in the Diploma. All international students who successfully complete a Curtin College Diploma, and who have met the progression requirements, are able to enter relevant undergraduate courses at Curtin University with advanced standing.

**Diploma courses are completed over three trimesters or two semesters (12 months), depending on the course chosen. Students studying on the trimester system may be able to fast-track their studies and complete the Diploma in two trimesters (8 months). See page 4 for more information.*

ACCREDITATION

Curtin College is a Registered Training Organization (RTO) overseen by the national Vocational Education and Training (VET) regulator, the Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA). ASQA regulates courses and training providers to ensure that the nationally approved quality standards are met. As an RTO, Curtin College has to adhere to the national set of standards for VET-accredited courses, which assures nationally consistent, high-quality training and assessment services for the clients of Australia's vocational education and training system.

Curtin College is a registered higher education provider under Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency (TEQSA). TEQSA regulates and assures the quality of Australia's Higher Education Sector (including universities). As a higher education provider Curtin College must adhere to these standards.



Built Environment

The Diploma of Built Environment provides entry into four different career paths:

Architectural Science

This course covers the design of buildings, the technical aspects of building construction, how architecture relates to people and how they live, and the communication of architectural ideas through written and spoken reports, photographs, drawings, models and the electronic media. You may use the knowledge gained in this course to seek employment within the architectural profession or building industry or continue study to complete the Master of Architecture to meet the requirements for registration as an architect.

Interior Architecture

Interior designers design quality environments for a diverse range of users and functions. They coordinate the design and construction of building interiors including commercial, workplace, hospitality, medical, gallery, and retail environments. In addition, interior designers may be involved with more transient environments and the associated displays for trade fairs, exhibitions, museums, and public events.

Interior designers find employment as independent interior design consultants, within interior design practices, as facility managers for large corporations, within architectural firms or, in some instances, working for organisations specialising in specific areas such as lighting design or furniture design, and in design education.

Construction Management

Construction Management is structured in a format that relates specifically to the career aspirations of students wishing to work as project managers, quantity surveyors, construction managers, estimators, and contract administrators, preparing students for professional careers in building, construction and related industries.

Urban & Regional Planning

This course has accreditation from the Planning Institute of Australia. The distinguishing characteristic of this course is the use of interdisciplinary knowledge and techniques in addressing environmental, social and design issues concerning the community. It is now widely accepted that successful human settlements must be properly planned and a range of control exists at all levels of government to protect the public interest in the development process. The involvement of individuals and community groups in the preparation and implementation of plans is now considered vital to successful development outcomes.

Engineering

The Diploma of Engineering offers students an industry-connected experience, uniquely placed to provide solutions to the challenges faced by the global community.

Engineers can find themselves working in many different disciplines and environments, from overseeing maintenance operations to designing and building engineered solutions, the range of career options is vast, varied and challenging. Curtin College will provide you with the skills and knowledge to enable you to start the academic studies you will need for your engineering career. The range of units you will study forms the basis of all engineering disciplines, allowing you to progress onto any of the degree options available at Curtin University.

Upon completion of the Diploma of Engineering, students proceed to one of the following Engineering disciplines: Chemical Engineering, (Chemical or Oil and Gas Stream*), Petroleum Engineering, Electronic and Communication Engineering, Electrical Power Engineering, Computer Systems Engineering, Software Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Mechatronic Engineering, Civil and Construction Engineering*, Metallurgical Engineering, Mining Engineering or Environmental Engineering. The Bachelor of Engineering has been accorded full recognition by Engineers Australia.

Health Sciences

Exercise, Sports & Rehabilitation Science

This course may help you become an exercise or sports scientist working with organisations, community groups, teams and individuals in exercise and sports settings as a: coach, personal trainer, gym instructor, exercise scientist evaluating training and performance.

You will develop a strong understanding of the human body and human health in your first year. Your subsequent years will be devoted to a more intensive study to further develop your knowledge and skills related to exercise and sports science. You will develop practical skills in laboratory settings which can be applied in a range of settings, working with people from all age groups. Emphasis is placed on professional development and strong interpersonal communication skills, which are attributes of client-centred practice.

Food Science & Technology

The food industry is the largest industry in the world and needs highly trained professionals in food science and technology to ensure the supply, quality and safety of food. The study of food science and technology involves the application of basic science and the latest developments in the handling, processing and packaging of foods from the farm to the consumer's plate. Food scientists determine the quality and properties of foods including the nutritive value, flavour, palatability, colour, texture and storage life using sensory, chemistry and microbiological techniques. Food scientists apply their knowledge of food science to operate, design and manage the facilities and equipment involved in the processing and storage of foods. Food scientists are responsible for the research and development of new food products and new technologies in the processing of foods.

Graduates may find employment in government and private industry - both in Australia and overseas. Areas of professional opportunity include food quality assurance, research and development of new products and new processing technologies, microbiology, technical consulting, and sales and marketing. Potential employers include food suppliers and manufacturers, beverage manufacturers, pharmaceutical companies, supermarket chains, airlines, wine companies, hospitals, teaching institutions and federal, state and private research laboratories.

Health Sciences

Graduates from the Health Sciences major may be employed in public health, health promotion, health administration or staff development positions in a variety of healthcare settings depending on units selected in their degree. Graduates have successfully entered postgraduate programs in medicine, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology, occupational health and safety and public health, as well as developing research careers. Due to a current scarcity of well-qualified health information professionals, the employment rate of graduates from the health information management major is excellent. Graduates are employed within health information management or in specialised areas such as clinical classification, health informatics, case-mix, quality and safety or project management in public and private health care facilities. Other areas include research, information system design and primary practice management.

Human Biology Preclinical

This degree is an excellent choice if you wish to pursue a career in allied health but are not yet ready to commit to a particular profession. Our graduates are able to access and critically evaluate scientific literature, are accomplished communicators and are well-equipped for a career in health-related research or education. The course emphasises the development of problem-solving skills in a collaborative environment.

This course prepares you for prerequisite examinations for graduate entry into medicine and dentistry. Graduates may also apply for entry into professional master programs including those in physiotherapy, occupational therapy, pharmacy, chiropractic, nursing, speech pathology and audiology. You may also qualify to enter research programs leading to higher degrees in the life sciences.

Laboratory Medicine

Laboratory Medicine is divided into six major areas of study: clinical biochemistry, haematology and blood transfusion serology, histopathology, diagnostic cytology, medical microbiology, medical biotechnology and immunology. All disciplines involve the study, examination and analysis of body fluids and tissues by physical, chemical, biochemical and biological methods to provide information essential for the diagnosis and treatment of disease.

A degree in laboratory medicine offers diverse career opportunities in hospital laboratories, private pathology, the biomedical and biotechnology industries, academic research centres, veterinary pathology and forensic science.

Molecular Genetics and Biotechnology

Molecular Biotechnology will dominate science and technology in the 21st Century. Molecular biotechnologists will help provide solutions to some of the most challenging and pressing problems facing humanity including prevention and control of human, animal and plant diseases, reversal of environmental degradation and feeding the world's population. "DNA chips" can detect expression of thousands of genes enabling rapid diagnosis of many diseases in a single test. Individuals will have access to their own DNA sequence and hence predict their propensity to develop cancer, Alzheimer's, diabetes, heart failure and many other human diseases. Genetic engineering is being used to design new vaccines, antimicrobial agents and pharmaceutical drugs for prevention and control of many diseases.

Graduates look forward to a wide array of challenging careers working alongside other scientists, medical and health-care professionals, engineers, computer software developers, lawyers, business professionals and entrepreneurs.

Occupational therapists have a broad education that equips them with skills and knowledge to work collaboratively with individuals or groups of people (and their communities) who have an impairment of body structure or function due to a health condition, and who experience barriers to participation. Occupational therapists believe that participation can be supported or restricted by physical, social, attitudinal and legislative environments.

ACCOMMODATION: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Curtin 6

These six town-houses, fully furnished and equipped, are located within a ten-minute walk from Curtin College. Each town-house has six rooms with a common kitchen, living room and laundry. All rooms are single study rooms equipped with a television antenna and telephone points. The complex is fully secured with alarms in each unit, as well as a security gate at the entrance.

Curtin 12

These 12 town-houses, fully furnished and equipped, are located within a ten-minute walk from Curtin College. Each town-house has six rooms with a common kitchen, living room and laundry. All rooms are single study rooms equipped with a television antenna and telephone points. Varying in size, most Curtin 12 bedrooms have a private en-suite bathroom, while the standard room has a shared bathroom facility. Curtin 12 also has 24-hour CCTV security surveillance.

14 McKay Street

Located within a ten-minute walk from the College, this location consists of two units, each with six rooms. Unit A features six superior rooms with three bathrooms. Unit B includes two deluxe rooms with en-suite bathrooms and four superior rooms with a shared bathroom. All rooms are fully furnished and equipped with telephone and television points.

Palmerston Street

A fully furnished, five-bedroom home located 1.5 kilometres (15-minutes' walk) from Curtin College. One bedroom has its own en-suite bathroom, while the remaining rooms have shared bathroom facilities. A number of shops, supermarkets and restaurants are located nearby, and the home is just a short bus ride from the Curtin Campus.

Homestay

Students may seek an authentic cultural experience by living with an Australian family in what is known as a 'homestay' arrangement. Some host families come from places like Europe, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia and Hong Kong. Homestay consists of a variety of family environments including married couples (with or without children), single parents or a single person. You are able to apply for homestay via the Perth Student Accommodation (PSA) website www.perthstudentaccommodation.com. A placement fee is paid to PSA. You may also access the homestay placement services offered by Australian Homestay Network at: www.homestaynetwork.org/public/curtin-collegestudents.

OTHER ACCOMMODATION OPTIONS

Perth Student Accommodation can provide the details of a local housing agency that has rental accommodation and information about other properties close to the College for students who prefer to make alternative arrangements for private accommodation.

ACCOMMODATION FOR STUDENTS UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE

Australian immigration rules for students under the age of 18 require that Curtin College approves all accommodation and welfare arrangements before students can travel to Australia. Curtin College will approve arrangements for students who will be living with parents, legal guardians, other appropriate family members or genuine family friends. The local carer must be of good character and be over the age of 21.

Where no local carer is available, Curtin College requires that students under the age of 18 reside in Homestay accommodation (see further information under Homestay).

Campus life

The Curtin University campus offers a safe and friendly environment in which to pursue tertiary studies.

Curtin University is a self-contained, student-oriented locality with many services and facilities within walking distance. In addition to the multi-story library and student bookshop, there are full banking facilities, many cafés and eateries, a chemist, a medical centre, shops, markets, a copy and design centre, a hairdressing salon, childcare facilities, an art gallery, an excellent gymnasium and fitness centre, and many active sports clubs and societies. Curtin College students are welcome to join in most aspects of University life and can become associate members of the Curtin Guild to gain on- and off-campus discounts, as well as access to clubs, competitions, events and campus sport. Curtin University is a completely smoke-free campus.

CURTIN COLLEGE - BUILDING 205

Curtin College classes are conducted on the Bentley campus of Curtin University in Perth. The College is housed in Building 205 in the heart of the campus. The building features a reception area on the ground floor, which handles all current and prospective student enquiries, as well as offices, classes and computer labs on the other floors.

HEALTH SERVICES

The Health Services Centre incorporates a doctor's surgery, where students can make appointments with either a doctor or nurse. Nursing staff are available to assist in the treatment of accidents and injuries that may occur on campus.

CHAPLAINCY SERVICES

Students have access to free and confidential chaplaincy services, which are provided for the benefit of the Curtin community. Visiting chaplains are active on campus and come from a variety of religious orientations. A prayer and meditation space and a reflection garden are available for people of any faith.

BOOKSHOP

The Co-operative Bookshop is located in the John Curtin Centre (Building 200). It stocks a wide range of textbooks as well as stationery, newspapers, magazines, novels, postage stamps, computer and mobile phone products.

LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SERVICES

Curtin's five-story library is at the centre of the campus and houses some of the latest research technology and academic resources. An enquiries desk is located on level two, where library staff are available to answer questions.

BUS STATION

The Curtin University bus station is one of the busiest in Perth, with seven different services stopping frequently during semester. The Circle Route, which runs between Perth's universities, train stations and shopping centres, stops every 15 minutes between 6:30am and 6:00pm on weekdays. During semester, Curtin University also offer a free courtesy bus that services some of the local suburbs.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

Curtin Security provide 24-hour support every day of the year. Buildings are only accessed via security cards and students can take advantage of the Safezone Student Safety App. It's one less thing to worry about.

ORIENTATION

As a new student, you must attend a compulsory orientation program conducted prior to the start of your studies. Orientation provides information and advice. Orientation is an opportunity to meet fellow students and key College staff and to become familiar with services and facilities.

You will have access to orientation leaders and student mentors, who are all successful students or recent Curtin College graduates and are available to give advice, provide reassurance and help students adjust to College life.

NAVITAS FAMILY BURSARY

Navitas offers financial support in the form of family bursaries. A family bursary applies where two or more students from the same family study at a Navitas institution, either at the same time or one after the other. For the purpose of this bursary, a family member is defined as a brother, sister, mother, father, son, daughter or stepchild.

The family bursary is granted to the second and subsequent family members who study with a Navitas institution. The bursary is equivalent to 10% of the tuition fee for one program only (i.e. Certificate IV, Foundation, Diploma, Bachelor degree or Master degree) with a Navitas institution, and is credited to the eligible student's tuition fee account each semester (the amount being relevant to the number of

units undertaken in that semester). The bursary does not apply to additional units or repeat units that may also be undertaken.

Please note:

1. The Navitas family bursary is not applicable to English language programs or any component of an English language program offered by Navitas members. Please contact the relevant Navitas member for more information.
2. The Navitas family bursary applies to students studying at ACN, Curtin College, Curtin Sydney, EI, FIC, HIC, LIBT, MQC, MIBT, PIBT, QIBT, SAIBT and NIC only.

NAVITAS ACADEMIC MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS

Navitas is committed to helping students achieve their career goals by offering scholarships to outstanding students. The Navitas academic merit scholarships are awarded each term by each Navitas pathway college or managed campus. Two students with the highest GPA in four or more subjects or courses will each receive a scholarship.

The scholarships cover:

One academic term or part thereof at a Navitas member institution (equivalent to tuition for a maximum of up to five academic subjects or courses) for:

- a Navitas Diploma, Advanced Diploma or Associate Degree (Australia)
- UTP Stage II or Associate Degree (Canada) - UPP or IUTP (USA)
- Undergraduate pathway program / 1st Year Degree (UK); or one academic semester of foundation or undergraduate study at ACN, Curtin University Sydney, Curtin Singapore or Macquarie city campus; or
- one academic semester of a Master program at Curtin University Sydney, Curtin Singapore or Macquarie City Campus.

The scholarships are applied to the tuition for the second term of enrolment only or final semester of study in an undergraduate/postgraduate program. The scholarship panel from each Navitas member institution will announce the recipients of the Navitas academic merit scholarships upon the completion of each term or

semester and the release of the results. The recipients will be notified by mail and the successful students posted on the college website, by consent. Students are not required to apply for the scholarship as it is awarded based on academic performance and ALL students are eligible.

ACADEMIC MERIT SCHOLARSHIP POLICY

1. Two scholarships for one academic term's tuition are offered at all Navitas member institutions each semester.
2. Students must be enrolled full-time to qualify for the scholarships.
3. Where the Academic Assessment Committee must differentiate between equally qualified applicants, additional factors such as educational disadvantage, member of specific equity group and/or significantly adverse personal circumstances may be taken into account.
4. Students are eligible to qualify for the scholarships after successful completion of their first term and after beginning their second term.
5. Students can only be awarded the scholarship once.
6. Students already in receipt of a scholarship may not be eligible for the Navitas scholarship.
7. Students are required to pay for any additional courses/subjects undertaken over and above the amount covered by the scholarship.

CALCULATION OF FEES

The tuition fees shown represent full-time study over the period indicated. Actual tuition fees are calculated on a per-unit basis, and variation to a normal full-time course load will result in a pro-rata adjustment to tuition fees. Tuition fees may rise each year.

This fee schedule should be read in conjunction with Curtin College's published refund policy.

Tuition fees are payable in advance prior to the commencement of a study period. A levy may be payable if fees are not paid by the due date. Students can only re-enrol if the tuition fees have been paid. Students repeating a failed unit have to pay tuition fees for that unit again.

Fees are payable before each study period. Students pay the rate applicable for that academic year and not the rate of the year in which they began their course. Please note that fees are subject to an annual review. Tuition fees do not include textbooks, stationery or OSHC charges.

An ancillary fee or additional separate charge may apply to particular units (e.g. uniform, lab coat, etc.).

Application process

1 Apply to Curtin College

Applications can be made at any time. Please make sure to allow adequate time for the processing of your student visa.

1. Complete the application form in this book or apply online to take advantage of priority processing.
2. Attach certified copies of all academic qualifications, including school reports, official examination certificates and evidence of English competency (if required). Certified translations must accompany those which are not in English. Copies can be verified by:
 - the official records department of the institute that originally issued documents
 - a Justice of the Peace or Public Notary
 - an authorised Curtin College representative
 - an Australian overseas diplomatic mission or Australian Education
3. If not applying online, send your documents to Curtin College or one of our representative offices.
4. Successful applicants will be sent a Letter of Offer. We aim to make offers within 48 hours if your supporting documents are complete, although there can be delays where credit/exemption is sought for previous study, further checks are required or during peak periods. It can take up to 10 days to process your application.

2 Pay your fees to accept your offer

Please include your full student ID on every transmission. We accept Visa, Mastercard and Bankcard credit card and Bankcard credit card. We accept EPTPOS but not cash, when making payment in our Perth office.

On receipt of your fees, your place at Curtin College will be confirmed. Most Letters of Offer issued by the college are packaged with an offer from Curtin University, hence Curtin College will issue eCoE's (Electronic Conditions of Enrolment) as required. The eCoE's are the key document required for your visa application.

3 Apply for a student visa

All international students must be in possession of a current study visa to be able to study in Australia. This visa is issued by the Australian Diplomatic Missions and application must be made directly to the nearest Consulate or Embassy. You are encouraged to use the services provided by our local agents who understand this process. The main documents required are:

- Letter of Offer from Curtin College
- Electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE), which is issued by the College upon receipt of fees
- Medical Examination Results
- Proof that OSHC has been arranged
- Proof of financial capability to pay tuition fees and living expenses.

Student visas are granted with certain conditions attached, including that you must:

- Satisfy course requirements - must attend a minimum 80% of all scheduled classes and make satisfactory academic progress
- Remain enrolled at all times
- Inform your education provider of any change of address
- Contact your current education provider if wanting to change institution within the first six months of commencing the principal course.

Curtin College is obliged under Australian Legislation to notify the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) immediately when becoming aware of and breach regarding a student visa.

4 Attend orientation to enrol

An orientation program is arranged for new students prior to the commencement of each study period. Attendance is compulsory for all new students. The date of your Orientation is detailed on your welcome letter. During Orientation you will learn about the campus, student support programs and meet your new classmates. You will also arrange your timetable and enrol in units as necessary for your course.

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

All students applying for a student visa must obtain OSHC for the entire proposed duration of their visa before the visa can be granted. These Conditions of Enrolment do not constitute a binding agreement. Successful applicants will receive the Terms of Offer, which together with the Letter of Offer and Acceptance of Offer, form a binding agreement between Curtin College and the recipient of a Curtin College Letter of Offer.

- The availability of a complaints or appeals process does not remove the right of the student to take action under Australia's consumer protection laws. Overseas students may access appeals advice and dispute resolution services through the Department of Education Services. - These Enrolment Conditions and the final Terms of Offer may be subject to variation as necessary to comply with any Australian Commonwealth or State law, regulation or amendment thereof.
- The College's responsibilities to the student pertain only to the Curtin College course outlined in the Letter of Offer. Further agreements must be signed with Curtin University for courses offered by and studied at that institution.
- All conditions and special notes contained in a Letter of Offer must be met and/or agreed to prior to Curtin College issuing a Confirmation of Enrolment.
- Students must meet the minimum English language proficiency requirement as stated in the Letter of Offer, for entry into the course. English language proficiency may be tested as part of the application process. Where the test reveals that the English language skills are insufficient, at the discretion of Curtin College students will be required to undertake English language support classes appropriate to their English level and course of study, at no further cost to the student, or a Tertiary Communications Skills unit in the first trimester or semester of study (chargeable), or enrol in an EUCOS course prior to the commencement of the Curtin College course.
- Attendance at orientation is compulsory; International students must ensure a relevant visa is issued in time to attend orientation. Special permission must be sought for non-attendance at orientation.
- Students are expected to attend all classes and undertake all tests and examinations during a course and must abide by all rules and regulations of Curtin College that are in force at the time of their enrolment.
- Curtin College may use its discretion to temporarily suspend the enrolment of a student on the grounds of misbehaviour by the student or on grounds of compassionate or compelling circumstances.

- Current (enrolled) students are required to notify Curtin College in writing or online of a change of address.

2. Fees

- A full time study load is equivalent to four units in a Certificate IV program, or 100 credit points in Diploma, or Tertiary Communication Skills plus two units (Certificate IV or Diploma).
- Tuition fees, charges and accounts are payable in advance of each trimester/semester and students are not permitted to commence a trimester/semester until all outstanding fees, charges and accounts issued by Curtin College are paid.
- The total tuition fees stated in a Letter of Offer are based on current prices and are therefore indicative only. The final tuition fees incurred may vary depending on unit selections, study load and promptness of payment. Students will receive a credit to their account where the incurred tuition fees are less than the amount paid in advance.
- Curtin College has the right to increase tuition fees and charges from time to time without notice. For more information on tuition fees refer to the Curtin College website at www.curtincollege.edu.au.
- Students enrolling in a second or subsequent study period at Curtin College will be notified of the date by which payment and enrolment must be completed. Failure to enrol by the notified date may incur a penalty fee.

- Should it be necessary for a student to repeat a unit, the full amount will be charged.
- As per section 27 of the ESOS Act, Curtin College must not receive more than 50% of the student's total tuition fees upfront. In the event that a commencing international student pays more than 50% of the required course fees before course

commencement, the College will refund any amount over 50% (unless the course is 24 weeks or less) to the student by direct deposit (electronic funds transfer) into a bank account nominated by the student.

3. Visa Conditions

- Student visas are normally issued for the period of the course or courses being offered. Students needing to extend their visa beyond this period should first consult Curtin College staff for assistance.
- International students are responsible for meeting all visa conditions as specified by the Australian Government. For more information on Australian Visa regulations refer to www.immi.gov.au/students.
- Curtin College is required by law to report to the Australian Government international students who: are found to be in breach of their visa conditions (e.g. not maintaining satisfactory progress); withdraw, defer or transfer to another provider. Reported students may be instructed by the government to leave the country.
- Students are required to notify the college in writing or online via the Curtin College student portal of a change of address within 7 days.
- School age dependents accompanying students to Australia will be required to enrol at a school and pay full fees if they are enrolled in either a Government or non-Government school.

4. Refunds and Cancellation of Enrolment

- Notification of cancellation or withdrawal from a course of study must be made in writing to Curtin College. Provided the College is notified by week four of the study period in question, a refund will be issued less any fees or charges payable for that study period. For full details refer to the Curtin College Refund Policy at www.curtincollege.edu.au/policies-curtin.
- The following table sets out the cancellation fees applicable to commencing international students.

Reason for withdrawal	Cancellation fee AUD\$
Visa refusal (Proof of refusal necessary)	\$500
Curtin College cancels a student's enrolment due to serious breach of international student visa conditions or serious misconduct.	100% of current semester fees
Withdrawal before Semester commencement date

More than 4 and up to 10 weeks	30% of semester fees
4 weeks or less	60% of semester fees
Withdrawal after Semester commencement date	
4 weeks or less	70% of semester fees
More than 4 weeks	100% of semester fees (No refund)

- A student whose withdrawal or enrolment cancellation is due to exceptional, compassionate or compelling circumstances can request that cancellation charges be waived. Requests should outline the reasons for the withdrawal and include documentary evidence such as medical certificates to support the request.

5. Tuition Assurance

From 1 July 2012 the Tuition Protection Service (TPS) replaced the Tuition Assurance Scheme and ESOS Assurance Fund. TPS is a placement and refund service for international students whose education provider is unable to fully deliver the course of study for which they have paid. Where the College is unable to provide a refund or place a student in a similar alternative course, TPS will place the student in a suitable alternative course at no extra cost. If TPS cannot place the student in a suitable alternative course, a partial refund may apply.

In the unlikely event that Curtin College is unable to deliver a course in full, students will be offered a refund of course fees paid to date. The refund will be paid within two weeks of the day on which the course ceased being provided. Alternatively, students may be offered enrolment in an alternative course by Curtin College at no extra cost. Students have the right to choose whether they would prefer a full refund of course fees, or to accept a place in another course. If they choose placement in another course, they will be asked to sign a document indicating they accept the placement.

6. Deferment, Withdrawal, Suspension and Cancellation of a Student's Enrolment.

- Prior to commencing their course and subject to approval students may apply in writing to defer course commencement to a later study period. Curtin College will credit any fees paid

to the relevant study period without penalty. If the student subsequently withdraws, the Refund Policy will apply as at the date Curtin College received the request for deferment.

Curtin College recognizes that students may have the need to defer or withdraw from their course of study at Curtin College. Each request must be made in writing to the Director of Marketing & Admissions (new students) or the Academic Director (enrolled students) or their nominees. Decisions on such requests will take into account information provided, circumstances leading to a request as well as regulatory requirements. Depending on the time the request is submitted an academic and/or financial penalty may apply (please refer to the Student Misconduct Policy & Refund Policy for details).

Deferral

A student may request deferment prior to commencement of or during their course. The grounds for deferment include delay in receiving a student visa (prior to course commencement) or compelling and compassionate grounds e.g. illness where a medical certificate states that the student is unable to attend classes, unexpected severe illness or death of a family member (prior to commencement or during the course). Students requesting deferment should apply to the College in writing stating their reasons for the requests and, where appropriate, supply relevant documentation.

Withdrawal

A student may request to withdraw from their program of study at any time before and during the trimester. Depending on the time the request is submitted an academic and financial penalty may apply.

Suspension or Cancellation

Curtin College has the right to suspend or cancel a student's enrolment of re-enrolment in response to serious misbehaviour or misconduct. Please refer to the Student Misconduct Policy and the Refund Policy for any financial and academic penalties that may apply. www.curtincollege.edu.au/policies-curtin

7. Transfer between registered providers

The Transfer Between Registered Providers Policy stipulates that it is an Australian regulatory requirement that students must complete six months of their 'principal course of study' before changing or transferring between registered providers. As a result, Curtin College is unable to enroll students from another registered provider prior to the student completing six months of their principal course of study, unless a letter of release is provided by the original provider. Students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with all Curtin College Policies at www.curtincollege.edu.au/policies-curtin.

8. Privacy of Information

- Personal information on students collected prior to commencing and over the course of their studies may be made available to relevant Commonwealth and State Government agencies and the Tuition Protection Service, to ensure compliance with the College's obligations under the ESOS Act 2000, the ESOS National Code 2007 and other relevant Commonwealth and State legislation. This information may include personal and contact details, course enrolment details and changes and the circumstances of any suspected breach by the student of a visa condition.
- In the event of circumstances requiring critical incident management, Curtin College reserves the right to disclose limited personal information of a student where it is considered necessary to meet or maintain its duty of care responsibilities to that student.
- By providing us with your personal information, you consent to Curtin College and Navitas Limited (Navitas) using your information to contact you on an ongoing basis in order to provide you with marketing information we think would be of interest to you, including by mail, email, SMS and telephone.
- Navitas may retain other companies and contractors to provide services for us, including entities located outside Australia, who will need to have access to your personal information to perform their obligations. Navitas may also use a cloud-based service to store and process personal information. By providing us with your personal information, you consent to us disclosing your information to entities located outside Australia for these purposes, on the basis that we are not required to ensure that any overseas recipient complies with Australian privacy laws.

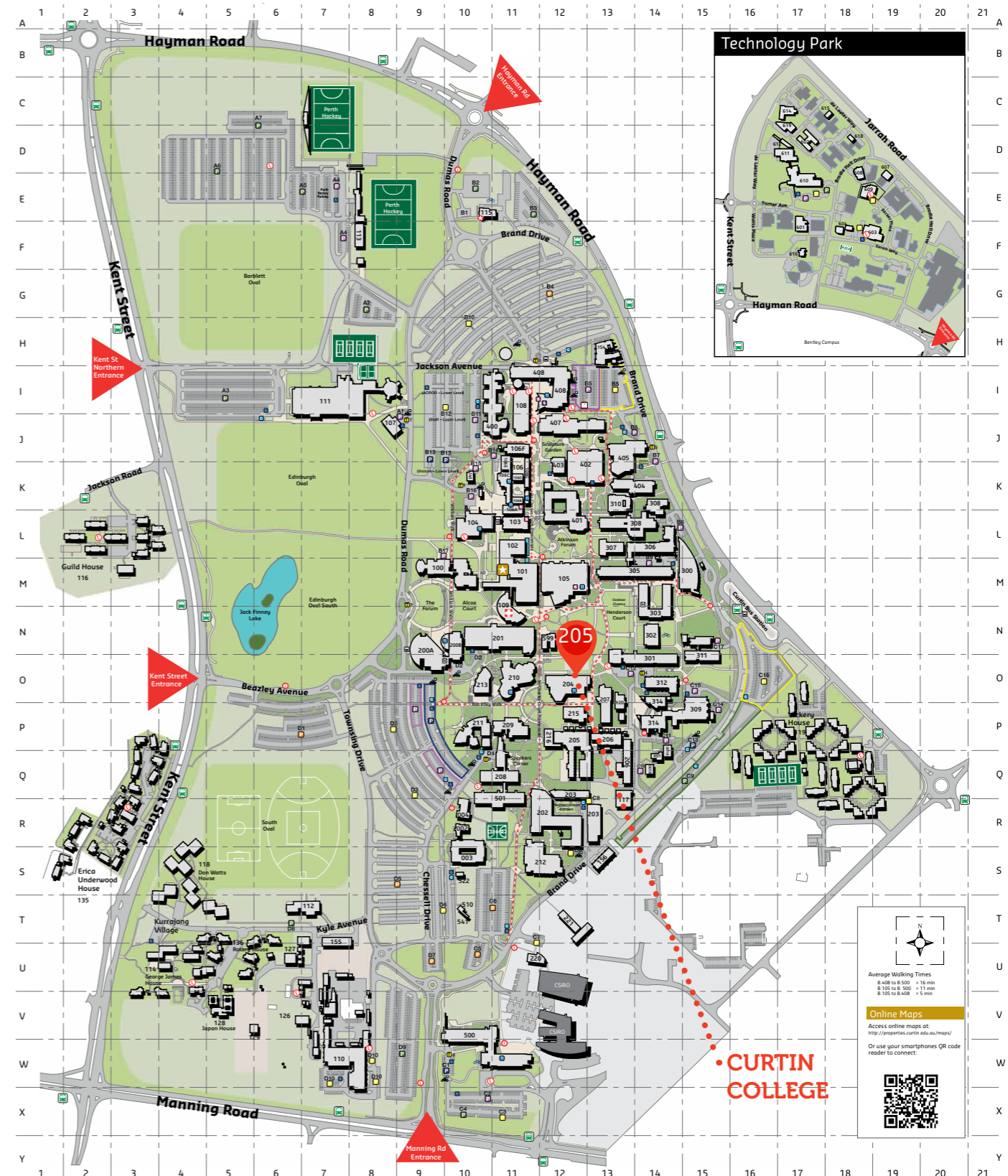
